Safeguarding adults and person-centred care

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Many adults are at **risk of harm**. These are individuals that require care and support, and are experiencing, or at risk of, abuse or neglect and unable to protect themselves.

The Care Act 2014 defines adult safeguarding as protecting an adult's right to live in safety, free from abuse and neglect.

Safeguarding requires people and organisations working together to prevent and stop both the risks and the actual experience of abuse or neglect. Health and social care organisations have particular responsibilities, but everyone involved with an adult at risk of harm has a part to play.

Who abuses adults?

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Some situations increase the risk of abuse. For example, in an individual's own home it is easier for an abuser to hide their actions from others.

Individuals are at a **higher risk of abuse and neglect** if:

- They are isolated and don't have much contact with other people
- They have memory problems or have difficulty communicating
- They become dependent on someone as a carer
- They don't get on with the main carer
- The carer is addicted to drugs or alcohol
- The carer relies on the individual for a home, or financial and emotional support
